2026 SEMINAR TITLE:

Native American History and Ethnoecology: The Cultural Relevance of Sustaining Indigenous Food Systems

Description

This seminar will focus on Native American communities, starting with a historical approach to build awareness of the Southwest region of tribal communities. A key goal is to provide teachers with foundatioal knowledge of Native American history, especially on important topics like boarding schools. After establishing this foundation, the seminar will transition into discussions about Indigenous food systems, food sovereignty, and ecology. Activities may explore how food and ceremonies historically intersect and how these traditions have evolved over time. The content will be adaptable across subjects such as social studies, English, and science, while aligning with educational standards. This seminar will include selected reading materials, presentations to create a meaningful learning experience for teachers to create a curriculum unit unique to the students they serve.

I am a member of the San Carlos Apache Tribe in Eastern Arizona. A majority of my research consists of utilizing various historical, indigenous, and theoretical applications to uncover the history of both the Apachean and Indigenous peoples within the Southwestern United States, beginning in the nineteenth century. Primarily, my work centers around bringing the history of the San Carlos Apachean peoples into the twentieth and twenty first centuries and beyond the "Apache Wars" of the nineteenth century. My most recent essay, published in "The North American West in the Twenty-First Century," analyzes the issues between

traditional and colonial forms of Apachean identity and its underlying consequences in the contemporary land disputes at both Dzil Nchaa Si'ann (Mount Graham) and Chi'chil Bildagoteel(Oak Flat). My dissertation titled "Issues of Identity: The San Carlos Apachean Peoples", explores the federal government's manipulation and undermining of traditional Apachean identity from the nineteenth to the twenty first century to form the "San Carlos Apache" identity.







Armando Medinaceli is a Bolivian ethnobiologist/ anthropologist with experience collaborating with Indigenous peoples in Bolivia, Mexico, Guatemala, and the US. His work ranges from community conservation, research ethics, ethnozoology, ethnobotany, Indigenous food systems and food sovereignty, biocultural diversity, sustainability, climate change, collaborative video, and more. Through his collaborative research approach and teaching experience, he has led research projects and educational

programs highlighting local perspectives and supporting Indigenous communities' self-determination. His current research documents current and traditional food systems in the Lagunas de Montebello region in Chiapas, Mexico. He also expects to continue his collaboration in Bolivia focusing on traditional music and biocultural conservation processes. As part of his commitment to collaborate ethically with Indigenous peoples, he is a charter member and current president (2025-2027) of the Sociedad Latinoamericana de Etnobiologia (Latin American Society of Ethnobiology) and serves as co-coordinator of its ethics committee. He is also a member of the ethics and advocacy committee of the Society of Ethnobiology (North America).
