#### IN MEMORY

Mary Jane Sidles, 82, wife of Craig Sidles, died on March 10, 2018 surrounded by her family. Mary was born in 1936 and had many accomplishments including being a talented seamstress and pianist. She earned her R.N. from Iowa Methodist School of Nursing and worked at the student health service at Cornell College. Craig and Mary were married in 1957. The Sidles moved to Flagstaff in 1968. Mary was a wife and mother as well as a nurse for 60 years.

Northern Arizona University—or Arizona Normal College as it was named back then—opened its doors in 1899 with 23 students, two faculty members (one, Almon Nicholas Taylor, was also the school president), and two copies of Webster's International Dictionary bound in sheepskin. "Recruitment" was a little different then—the first president scoured the countryside in horse and buggy seeking students to fill the classrooms of the single school building (now known as Old Main). In 1901, the first graduating class consisted of four women who received credentials to teach in the Arizona Territory.

**The Depression** NAU enjoyed growth over the next 20 years, but even the university town of Flagstaff was not immune to the effects of the Great Depression. In fact, the only bank in town closed its doors in June of 1932. The president at the time, Grady Gammage, believed that higher education could overcome the Depression, and that the university offered a critical service that would fare well in hard times. He was right. After doubling down on his education stance and belief in NAU, Gammage presided over a Depression-era enrollment increase from 321 students in 1930 to 535 by 1940. Many significant historical events also occurred during these hard times. In 1937, graduate work at the university became possible with the addition of the Master of Arts in Education, and in 1939, Ida Mae Fredericks became the first Hopi to receive a college degree.

**World War II** The entry of the United States into World War II precipitated a large drop in enrollment as collegeage men entered the armed services. By the 1944–1945 academic year, just 161 students attended class on the Flagstaff campus, yet the university survived by making valuable contributions to the war effort. The college served as a site for the Navy's V-12 training program, one of 150 schools selected from 1,600 contenders. The Campus Civilian Defense Program maintained an aircraft spotting post, one of only 84 such posts in the United States. The university even banned all gas-powered vehicles and those with rubber tires from the Homecoming Parade in 1942 to demonstrate its dedication to rationing programs.

**Becoming a university** In the 1950s, the university entered a period of exceptional growth. Students could earn an education specialist degree as well as master's degrees in the arts and sciences. Much of the expansion can be attributed to Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup, who has the distinction of serving the longest term as President (1957 to 1979). Building on this growth, the road to becoming a university began with the creation of the forestry program in 1958 and increased research activities. Pleased with the array of quality academic programs and evergrowing student body, the Arizona Board of Regents recommended that the then Arizona State College become Northern Arizona University (NAU), effective May 1, 1966.

**Northern Arizona University today** More than 60 years later, NAU has much to be proud of, including nationally ranked programs, high-research status, and emergence as a leader in sustainability, science, business, green building, and cultural arts. Noted Flagstaff historian Dr. Platt Cline characterized NAU as an institution that has thrived due to strong leadership, the devotion of alumni and faculty, and community support. Empowered by the Arizona Board of Regents to provide educational opportunities statewide, the university now serves students at the Flagstaff campus, multiple statewide locations, and online. NAU offers more than 150 combined undergraduate and graduate degree programs, all distinguished by an ongoing commitment to close student-faculty relationships.

# GETTING TO KNOW WHO IS BEHIND THE SCENES

Introducing those worker bees "behind the scenes" members of

the NAURA Executive Committee this Flash newsletter is pleased to present: John Nauman—President-Elect John was born in Iowa in 1955, moving to Southern California three years later where he grew up in the Upland area. He graduated from Upland High School then attended Chaffey Community College, UCSB, (got married to Susan!) and then completed a BS in Chemistry from



Cal Poly Pomona. While finishing his BS John worked as an analyst at Mobil Chemical and then General Dynamics full time. After graduation Susan and John decided it was time to get out of the smog and traffic and went looking for jobs in towns with a university and ski resort and Flagstaff was the first stop. John applied for a lab manager position with the NAU chemistry department and was hired (after all his name was NAUman) and started the position in August of 1981 managing the instructional lab program for chemistry until July of 2016. While at NAU he kept below the radar but had a few notables: received a President's Award in 1984, completed a MS in Chemistry in 1989, and was awarded Outstanding Student Employee Supervisor for NAU in 2007. He also focused on laboratory safety developing and teaching the "Lab Safety and Supervision Course" for over 20 years. He also helped with the design of the Wettaw, Science Lab, and Health Science buildings focusing on instructional lab areas and building lab safety. He stayed at NAU for 35 years saying, "I really enjoyed working with our students and student TAs and stockroom employees and the great faculty and staff in the chemistry department and of course living with skiing, hiking, mountain biking, etc. at our door step and raising two kids here (Travis and Katelin) was kind of nice too!" John is a member of Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church and the Flagstaff Water Group advocating for good water policy in Flagstaff. # **Tozan Kilns and Japanese Teahouse**

Please join the NAU Retirees Association for a tour of the Tozan Kilns and Japanese Teahouse on **Tuesday, September 25 at 1:30 pm**.

The Tozan (meaning East Mountain) Kilns are wood-fired kilns on south campus. There are only three Tozan Kiln sites in the world. The first is in Himeji City Japan, the second in Flagstaff Arizona, and the third in Nanaimo, British Columbia. They were designed under the supervision of Yukio Yamamoto, the master of the Tozan kilns from Himeji, Japan. They were completed in 1986 with the final addition of steel supports. The entire process took ten months to complete and involved approximately 200 people from the U.S. and Japan. There are a total of seven kilns to explore in the Ceramics Complex. The neighboring Japanese Teahouse was constructed in 2002 and is surrounded by a garden. The tour will be lead by Jason Hess, Professor of Art and head of the NAU Ceramics Program. This tour is on uneven ground so it may not be suitable for all retirees. There is a small parking lot on Lone Tree just south of Pine Knoll or you can walk down from the parking lot at KNAU.
