Background

ABOR Policy 2-203.A requires each university annually to submit an Academic Strategic Plan to the Academic Affairs Committee. The Plan is to provide information on the key academic initiatives planned by the institution and describe how they support both the University's strategic plan and the system-wide strategic plan of the Arizona Board of Regents. The Committee's approval authorizes the university to implement changes outlined on the plan.

Statutory/Policy Requirements

ABOR Policy 2-203.A, "The Academic Strategic Plan"

Strategic Implications

Goal One of the ABOR 2020 Vision addresses the need for the universities to establish and insure academic excellence. The Academic Strategic Plan serves as a primary mechanism by which the Board provides oversight and direction for the academic initiatives and mission of each university.

Discussion

The Academic Strategic Plan includes the following requests and information:

- An Inventory of all academic degree programs which are expected to be planned, implemented, merged with other programs or eliminated in the upcoming year.
- A list of anticipated changes to academic organizational units.
- Status report on the previous year's plan.
- Information on the institution's centers and institutes, created and eliminated.

- Upon approval by the Committee, most proposals listed on the Plan may be implemented without further review or action.
- Those academic programs that will be funded with additional state funds or programs fees do require additional approval by the Academic Affairs Committee before they may be implemented or enroll new students. Approval of the program by the AAC does not constitute approval of program fees; that occurs during the Board's regular fee setting process.
- Academic Strategic Plans may be modified during the year with the approval of the AAC.

The Academic Strategic Plan includes a narrative overview and three reporting sections:

- Part I Proposed New Programs and Units for 2011-2012
 This section addresses the plans for academic programs and organizational changes anticipated for the upcoming year (AY 2011-12).

 (changes made, those still pending and those not pursued).
- Part III Report on Centers and Institutes
 According to ABOR Policy 2-301.G, the universities are required to report on their plans and past actions regarding centers and institutes in the Academic Strategic Plan.

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2010-11 ACADEMIC STRATEGIC PLAN for 2011-12

Academic Program and Organizational Unit Initiatives for 2011

In last year's Academic Strategic Plan, NAU indicated that it has engaged in a process of detailed program analysis and assessment in efforts to streamline curriculum, reduce time to degree, reduce credits towards the baccalaureate. provide students with more opportunities for receiving credit-by-exam, and overall increasing the number of college graduates. In addition, we have engaged all our academic units in advancing course redesign in efforts to improve student performance, increase student learning, and increase our rates of retention/persistence from the freshman to sophomore year. All academic units have been involved in this planning to some degree. One very important result has been the consolidating of degree pathways (tracks or emphases), the elimination of some majors, the rolling up of others into a single degree program. and basically reducing the number of options we are supporting in a given degree track. Using ABOR's Methodology for Low Productive Programs, NAU examined the number of graduates over two consecutive three-year periods and. where the number of graduates did not meet thresholds, we requested units do a deep evaluation and consider elimination of these pathways. The extensive list of disestablished tracks is appended to the end of the templates. Because the ABOR Academic Program Inventory (API) rolls up many areas into a single degree program, not all of our disestablished tracks appear on that API: nevertheless, the Board may wish to review those that we have disestablished.

In addition to intensive curricular streamlining, NAU continues to bring forward new lower-cost degree options for its NAU-Yuma branch campus (e.g. Logistics and Supply Chain Management in the Bachelor of Applied Science program) and to develop areas of emphasis (e.g. Entrepreneurship) within our Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies for NAU Yavapai. These will bring new highly structured degree programs relevant to regional workforce needs locally. New program development on the Flagstaff campus is extremely limited.

NAU also proposes expediting degree completion by accepting more credits from community colleges. Rather than accept 82 (previously approved) credits from community colleges in Nursing, for example, we now request a further exception to Board policy by allowing us to accept 90 credits towards the baccalaureate in the RN to BSN program.

Proposed Program Changes

While NAU has no intention of reducing its graduate and research emphases, we would like to note that a particular Ph.D. program in History that has fallen below ABOR thresholds for graduation for two consecutive three-year cycles, is now proposed for elimination. However, at the same time as we make this shift, we are bringing other areas of research into greater prominence. One year ago we began a new Masters degree program in Climate Science and Solutions; this year, we are in the planning stages for a new Ph.D. program in Earth and Society, developed as an interdisciplinary program spanning geology, engineering, environmental policy and sustainability, and business.

At the undergraduate level, very few program changes are presented. Following the move of the Bachelor of Arts/Science in Interdisciplinary Studies to NAU-Yuma to serve as a platform for programming within the Extended Campuses division, NAU Flagstaff continues its development of an interdisciplinary baccalaureate program with thematic strands aligned with the foci for global education global studies, diversity, and sustainability. The degree will be distinct from the BA/BS in Interdisciplinary Studies and offered exclusively on the Flagstaff campus (tentative name: Bachelor of University Studies). While we anticipate that this new degree program will be approved in the current academic year for initial launch in Fall 2011, it will begin as a "phase I" degree plan with limited curricular options; for Fall 2012, it will evolve into "phase II" as a truly interdisciplinary degree program with a variety of degree and degree-completion formats.

NAU's plan to develop a Master's Degree in Physician Assistant Studies is fully underway. PA's are in great demand in Arizona, needed to fill workforce needs for individuals with academic and clinical competence and increasing the number of practitioners who can deliver medical and osteopathic care under the supervision of a physician. We have hired a Founding Chair and now request to formally establish the Department of Physician Assistant Studies. Having hired initial staff, we are presently searching for faculty, and we expect an initial accreditation review in the Fall of 2011 (which has been formally scheduled).

Expansion of our Physical Therapy program into the Phoenix area is also under development. Our exceedingly popular DPT program in Flagstaff simply cannot accommodate anywhere near the number of students wishing to pursue this important degree; therefore, we anticipate expansion of this program in the coming year.

While we continue to plan for a doctoral program in Occupational Therapy to be delivered in Flagstaff, we have slowed down our planning for this degree program, investing initially in the new PA program. Additionally, we continue with our planning to shift our Masters in Nursing Practice to a Doctorate of Nursing Practice (DNP) which will be the new standard for 2015.

Organizational Changes

Organizational changes are largely absent this year due to the fact that we significantly restructured the academic division in 2004 and again in 2008-09. Merging many of our departments in both the science and humanities areas has resulted in improved interdisciplinarity and better engagement between related disciplines which strive to integrate curriculum rather than maintain arbitrary academic silos.

Centers and Institutes

NAU wishes to establish two new institutes relevant to our expertise in climate change, energy solutions and sustainability.

Decision-Making Process

The curricular streamlining that has taken place over the last two years has been developed by faculty in academic units. Faculty, chairs and deans have worked through all the low productive program issues, and the changes that we present resulted from that faculty work. All curricular changes flow from the faculty in the unit to the College curriculum committees and ultimately the University Curriculum Committee that is an arm of the Faculty Senate.

One efficiency that we have taken advantage of this year has been adding "Curriculum Process Associates" (CPA's) in the colleges who have been able to manage much of the administrative work of curricular change rather than have faculty manage the minutiae of revision and minor change, which have had a tendency to dominate committee work. Presently, these individuals are able to take care of the execution of minor changes, leaving the real curricular change to faculty, chairs and the members of the University Curriculum Committees.
