Senator McClintock: If there are no corrections, the minutes are approved.

Call to the Audience

Item A: W.A Franke College of Business – Dean Goebel

Dean Goebel: Mr. Bill Frankie, he is the one who donated the money back in 2007-2008 to make it the Franke College of Business. He had some very specific things he wanted us to focus on and that is he wanted every student to have a writing class because he believed that good writing is really important, and another thing he wanted us to do was offer an ethics class so we do have a business ethics class as well. This is the only college I've heard of that has both of those classes as a required part of the curriculum. We are AASB accredited which means that it puts us in the top 5% of all business schools and that's over 16,000 business schools worldwide. Undergraduate degree programs are what you would expect in a college of business, so accounting, economics, finance, hotel and restaurant management, management and marketing. We do have accreditation for hotel and restaurant management as well and that puts us in the top 20% of all hospitality programs in the country. Graduate degree programs, we have a masters degree in business administration. We have several certificates and minors and those can be found in various specialty areas of the college. Nonprofit and entrepreneurship is something that's pretty

unique to our college. That came from a proposal that was made to a funding group and one of the problems with nonprofit and entrepreneurship is that you have a lot of people who want to do something to help others and if they have any success the nonprofit becomes more like a business because it has to be run with employees. Several people who have those really big hearts don't have that business background for once it becomes a big operation. We proposed a center for nonprofit and entrepreneurship and we now teach students the business of operating a nonprofit. We have a five class series in that group and it's a really unique thing that our college does and I think it's really helpful. From a student involvement standpoint we have 27 affiliated student organizations with the Franke College of Business. When I arrived we didn't have a way of getting student input from inside the college so I formed the leadership council and is composed of the presidents and vice presidents of those 27 affiliated student organizations so we have meetings once a month at 7am. It's been a really great experience to get input from students in that way. We also have college ambassadors. We have maybe 12-14 ambassadors. They give tours in the building and meet with perspective students and it's very important to have that group involved. We have a veterans student center in the building and we have some donors who provided funding for that over the years. We also engage in several student professional development opportunities. We have a business professional program to help transition to the business and college life and elevate and develop communication skills. We have a business communication center which develops writing skills and gives students an edge in the marketplace. We have a professionalism recognition program where students are able to develop and demonstrate their professional qualities in the classroom. If they complete the requirements for that they get a letter from the dean in their senior year and that's something they can put in their resume. We have the business leadership program and there are specific requirements for that as well. Listening, communicating, and persuading. Sophomores get involved in that for the next three years. We have a lot of internships and executive job shadowing. We have a lot of human resource students who are going to corporate offices, a lot of great opportunities and experiences for them. We have mock interviews, resume writing assistance, career fairs. This past fall we had the Franke leadership week and business etiquette dinner and a speed networking event. In the Fall 2018 career fair we had 160 companies participate in our career fair and over 650 students attended so a lot of great opportunities to get interviews scheduled. We had over 400 on campus interviews and skype interviews in this past year. We have specific skype interview rooms set up which has a lot more professional of a setting than a dorm room. We've been ranked the 7th best hotel and hospitality college in the U.S. Accounting has been ranked the best in the state. Our sales team has participated in competitions and is recognized as one of the best in the country.

Senator Freitas: I wanted to ask a question about strengthening the relationship between ASNAU and the Franke School of Business. I think we're really fortunate right now but next year we're going to have two new senators and I'm wondering how we should continue our relationship?

Dean Goebel: I've always been really impressed with the senators. Last year they reached out to me and we were able to schedule some things with the students. This year I think we've increased that involvement because of your involvement as an ambassador and the dean's leadership council. If we don't have that going forward I welcome the opportunities for anyone to reach out. I think it's important that if one of the senators can't attend those meetings it would be important to send someone who can pass on information.

Senator Freitas: I wanted to see if you would be open to having a senator at your meetings. I talk to a lot of groups and individuals but it would be good to have the connection to the presidents of organizations.

Dean Goebel: The last meeting we did have a guest speaker and she came in and talked about our upcoming career fair and that was the first time we had a guest speaker but I'm open to having more.

Senator Freitas: Okay, I'll be contacting you about that then because we have a lot of events coming up.

VPSA Riggins: What kinds of things do you guys invest in?

Dean Goebel: I don't know. That's a good question and I imagine it's mostly stocks but I don't know. The NAU Foundation has set aside a certain amount of funds for us to do that and we're very thankful for that and we have to follow foundation rules on that but I'm not specifically sure.

Senator Majkrazk: You mentioned a little about nonprofits that students were working with. Have you ever tried to collaborate with other colleges about possibly getting marketing students to work with engineering students capstones for the technical side of things?

Dean Goebel: That's an interesting question because last year there was a competition where the engineering college and the business college partner up to develop a wind turbine that will develop electricity and a business plan on how to market that design.

Chief of Staff O'Reilly: As an HRM student I'm curious how much does the college of business play in hiring the executive director?

Dean Goebel: A lot. The person we're going to hire reports to me so I will have a big say in that. The search committee has narrowed it down to the finalists and they have been on campus in the past week and I will collect all the information.

Senator Hernandez: How does FCB collaborate with other colleges?

Dean Goebel: That's a really good question. As one of the academic colleges I work closely with the other deans to help make this educational experience better for all students and make this a better place to work. We're in regular contact as a group and it has to do with policies and procedures and how things happen on campus. We work together on curriculum issues so we have a process for approving those curriculum programs as a group. Another thing that we're doing is developing dual-degree programs, especially at the graduate level.

Senator Rose: I'm currently working on the nonprofit certificate. Would there be more courses offered in the future or turn into a minor?

Dean Goebel: Right now there's a five course sequence. We don't offer all five of them every semester but we offer them. We don't have any plans to make it a minor yet.

Senator Freitas: I'm also enrolled in the nonprofit certificate, but are there any plans for a minor in actual entrepreneurship? I think we have nonprofit entrepreneurship but there's some online ones that aren't for Flagstaff Mountain students.

Dean Goebel: We don't have any plans right now but one of the things I'm going to be working on it more integration with the online programs. Getting those credits to count towards classes at Franke is a pretty big issue.

Item B: Vice Provost of Teaching, Learning Design and Assessment – Laurie Dickson

Kim: I work in Communications and Media Communications for the president's office. I'm part of a team that's talking to leadership groups around campus. NAU was awarded reaccreditation for 2018-2028 at the end of 2017. During the site visit the HLC team found one area where they found that the university met it but with concerns. What they asked for was an interim report, and we are apart of the report writing team. The report is due at the end of May and should include the documentation of the actions taken to

improve communication between senior administration and the staff, faculty, and students of NAU. This interim team has come together and decided that it's important to go out to the groups and at each of the meetings we are asking three very specific questions. The timeline, we're getting this information from all the groups and the writing will be a draft report and again share it with the campus community and have open forum sessions in April and then get those edits back and the desire that the report is complete before everyone leaves for the semester.

Bruce: The accreditation by the higher learning commission is a very important part of the university. It influences the ability of folks to use NAU credits at another university. It also influences financial aid. We go through this process every ten years. It's not unusual for universities to have a requirement for an interim report and no one is perfect. It's about concerns and looking at what we're doing now and how to improve the communications process.

Laurie Dickson: As with everything on the university campus there are a number of groups and organizations and we try to send representatives out to present information on a regular basis. We have ongoing schedules that keep those going about important topics that include campus forums and presentations on topics that are always high priority like tuition and things like that but what we've tried to do is keep communications regular through representation. This is the check in point to see how that's going and for you to provide feedback and further information, and also ways how you have helped to increase that dialogue.

Three questions. (1) What actions have you taken to improve communication? (2) What actions are you aware of that others have taken to improve communication? (3) What additional actions can be taken to improve communication?

Senator Burke: We are in frequent contact with all of our deans. We schedule events with the deans each semester in order to get engagement with them and we advertise them a lot so we get students to come.

Senator Freitas: ASNAU has changed their action plan. Before we used to advertise to students through the presidents weekly email but we also have a social media account that the staff work with and they do a great job advertising anything going on in campus that has to do with students. I think that breaks through barriers because students won't read emails but they will read Instagram posts.

VPSA Riggins: I would also say the senate in general is the best way we communicate with our organizations and clubs and other students. We host different forums and tabling to communicate with students.

President Graham: My position does send our weekly emails to all Flagstaff mountain students. We have a new position this year, Club Manager, and they send out emails to the club presidents which is another way of distributing information directly to campus leadership. We've had council of presidents meeting where we let them know what specifically ASNAU is up to.

Kim: The second question: What actions are you aware of that others have taken to improve communication?

Senator Hernandez: I'm aware of several events that higher administration is hosting where I was able to meet President Cheng.

Senator Freitas: I started to realize that more professors are starting to utilize blackboard to communicate so you'll receive an email but you'll also see the message at the top of your course so you get it in two places so it's very clear.

Senator McClintock: I know one of my old professors didn't like sending out emails because students don't always check it so she used a group chat app that went straight to our phones.

Senator Schonbrun: NAU PD has been reaching out to us to put on a safety fair for students as a way to reach out.

VPSA Riggins: Communicating with the community liaison and also the alumni series.

Senator Majkrazk: I think the app that we use, the NAU app, we get notifications like for Louie's Leftovers. So things like that where they are able to send a flash message to the entire campus can be very beneficial.

President Graham: I do like how Louie's Leftovers is something we can opt into. I appreciate President Cheng's email last semester about the snow days because students always have questions so I felt that was really helpful for students to understand.

Senator Nardi: NAU PD has the alert system so students are up to date with the safety on campus.

Kim: Last one: What additional actions can be taken to improve communication?

Senator Freitas: Something that I noticed this year is that ASNAU isn't mentioned at all in student orientation. I think that if there was a way that ASNAU is mentioned so they know there is a voice for students and a resource for students. A lot of students are confused about what we are and strengthen that communication.

Chief of Staff O'Reilly: I know this is something I really appreciated last semester with President Cheng when she called that emergency meeting to talk with the senators about the hot topics that were happening around campus. Being apart of ASNAU it meant a lot to me to have President Cheng want to sit down and talk with us and have us asking questions and her taking notes. There's always hot topics on campus so I think even ASNAU sitting down with President Cheng in a setting like that when she is available because I really felt a connection.

Kim: I would say that if you think of something after this please feel free to send us an email because we would love to hear it.

Chief of Staff O'Reilly: Going back to forums I know the senators are holding a forum next week in our ASNAU office and inviting faculty and staff. This year for the homecoming carnival we invited the presidents cabinet just so they can see students in an informal setting and I think that is something that can be continued as well.

Kim: Thank you for this opportunity and this time, and if you think of anything else please send us an email.

Item C: Club Manager – Jo Williams

Jo Williams: We are having this event called the High Pine Awards and you can win your club a plaque saying what award you won. I have flyers. You apply online. I just want to let everyone who's here know and you can apply until March 31st.
