#### MSI TEACHER ADVISORY COUNCIL

Inspired by our intensive study tour of Holocaust-related sites in Poland and Germany in May 2022 with Arizona teachers, we created an Advisory Council with and for teachers to address urgent and long-term issues related to the teaching of the Holocaust and genocides in Arizona schools. The Martin-Springer Institute Teacher Advisory Council (MSI-TAC) started its work in the spring of 2023.

With our ever-changing academic environment, MSI-TAC will play an important role in moving Holocaust studies forward in Arizona classrooms and ensuring that we are equipped to properly teach Holocaust and genocide studies.

#### JUNE & JULY TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In June 2023, after a long hiatus due to COVID restrictions, we again offered our 2-day teacher training seminar, The Merrill and Rhoda Abeshaus Advanced Holocaust Educator's Institute. It focused on the graphic novel *Maus* by Art Spiegelmann. Given the interest of teachers to include visual storytelling in their teaching as well as the



troubling development of book banning, the first day introduced scholarly perspectives on *Maus* (presented by NAU faculty), and the second day focused on best practices for using graphic novels and literature in the classroom, facilitated by Carrie Olson.

In July 2023, we offered a new program for 12 educators with substantial experience of teaching about the Holocaust. The "Four-Day Intensive Institute" was structured around learning from each other's best practices and adjusting one's teaching to the local demands of each school. It was moderated by Kim Klett.



Networking with educators passionate about Holocaust studies helped me to grow as an educator and historian through constructive dialogue among AZ teachers, scholars, and state officials. I am better prepared now to critically examine the Holocaust and genocides with my students.

# PROJECT: GINO PARIN AND THE HOLOCAUST

In Spring 2023, we opened the exhibition "A Complicated Life in Complicated Lives: Gino Parin and the Holocaust." Since Fall 2021, an interdisciplinary team of students, under the mentorship of art historian Alexandra Carpino and Björn Krondorfer, researched Parin's life during the rise of fascism in the Italian city of Trieste and his eventual death in the Nazi camp of Bergen-Belsen. Over 130 people attended the opening on March 23 at NAU's Clara M. Lovett Art Museum, with a total of 550 visitors during the duration of the exhibition.

A few weeks after the closing of the exhibition, we launched the podcast series, "Gino Parin in Trieste: Portrait of an Artist During the Holocaust." The writing and recording were carried out by an interdisciplinary student-faculty team. Watch or listen to our 9 episodes at

The project involved NAU faculty from Comparative Cultural Studies, Theatre, Music, and the School of Communication.



#### BĘDZIN EXHIBIT KEEPS TRAVELING

For the last ten years, our traveling exhibit, *Through the Eyes of Youth: Life and Death in the Będzin Ghetto* has been displayed in many places. It opened in August 2022 in the Cape Town Holocaust Center in South Africa (Krondorfer attended the opening and offered a workshop for educators and docents) and was seen by 1,300 people.



In Arizona, the exhibit traveled to Chandler and Lake Havasu City last year, with seven schools already indicating their interest for 2023-2024 season.

Because of the high demand for this exhibit, the current set-up shows serious signs of wear-and-tear. We are seeking donors to help us with the cost of creating a new version of this traveling exhibit. Please contact us if you are interested in supporting it.

## SPANISH CIVIL WAR PROJECT

With the inauguration of the website "Stories from the Spanish Civil War" in May 2023, we concluded the student-faculty research project on the Spanish Civil War. Please visit our website at spanishcivilwarfan.org.

The work on the project stretched over several semesters, with changing student teams from a variety of disciplines, mentored by Krondorfer and former NAU professor of History, Ana Varela. The project started when Phoenix resident Bernd Häber, who was born in East Berlin, introduced us to a fan from the Spanish Civil War, signed in

the fall of 1938 in Spain by 31 men from the United States, Canada, and the UK. They had volunteered to fight on the Republican side against General Franco's nationalist uprising.

Our students used numerous resources, including archives in New York and Russia, to reconstruct the men's stories and thus retell part of the history of the International Volunteers in the Spanish Civil War. Since the lives of the Canadian and British signatories of the fan have not yet been researched, we are hoping to find partners at universities in the UK and Canada to complete the project in the future.

What I thought to be a short project turned into delving into the lives of many International Volunteers in the Spanish Civil War. I am honored to have been part of this project.


#### ALCOHOL AND GENOCIDE

Edward Westermann, Regents' Professor at Texas A&M University and historian of World War II and the Holocaust, presented a lecture on his new book, *Drunk on Genocide*. About 100 people (mostly students) attended the main lecture, listening attentively to how the use of alcohol facilitated the mass murder of Jews.

Westermann also conducted a session specifically for Active Duty and Military Veteran Students as well as a separate talk with the Graduate Association of Political Science at NAU's College of Social and Behavioral Sciences College.

SBS students listened to how important a role alcohol played in the social interactions of many perpetrators. Westermann's research even opened a conversation among undergraduates about alcohol-driven events on campus today.


#### Lectures on the Holocaust



Our main speaker event, in honor of International Holocaust Remembrance Day (January 27), featured Michael Berenbaum. Berenbaum had been instrumental in the creation of the permanent exhibit at the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum and is an internationally renowned speaker on the Holocaust and antisemitism.



Thanks to a generous grant by the Gerald Rosenbluth Family Fund, MSI was able to arrange a lecture on "Contemporary Antisemitism" at Temple Solel in Paradise Valley (with help of the Phoenix Holocaust Association) before Berenbaum joined the NAU community for his talk on the "Holocaust in Today's Political Climate." He also met with a group of NAU students in a smaller setting.




Another talk on the Holocaust featured Christin Zühlke's lecture on "Yiddish Testimonies of Sonderkommando Prisoners in Auschwitz-Birkenau." Zühlke, a recent PhD, spoke in chilling detail about the dilemma of Jewish prisoners forced to work in the crematories and gas chambers of Auschwitz.

## **WORKS IN PROGRESS**

#### **GULAG AND THE HOLOCAUST**











After a few years of planning, MSI hosted the international scholarly symposium at NAU, *Holocaust\*\*\*Gulag:* Repressing, Rescuing, and Regulating Recalcitrant Legacies (March 9-12, 2023).

Jointly organized by MSI and Dr. Katya Tolstaya (Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam), with generous support by a family fund and the German Academic Exchange Service, the symposium addressed the difficult and painful histories of the Holocaust and the Gulag and probed how these (unresolved) long-lasting legacies intrude into contemporary society, culture, religion, and politics.

The invited scholars from diverse national backgrounds (Russian, U.S. American, Dutch, Polish, Canadian, German, Lithuanian) brought to the table their different disciplinary expertise, including History, Comparative Literature, Anthropology, Religious Studies, Sociology, Memory Studies, Cultural Studies, and Holocaust & Genocide Studies.

The symposium started with a public forum at NAU's Cline Library on the topic, "Lethal Legacies: The Soviet Gulag and the Nazi Genocide," conveying to the attending students and community the importance of these two lethal legacies of twentieth century Europe – and what they might teach us about our situation today. To this end, the symposium participants are now working on an edited volume, *Recalcitrant Legacies: Narratives of the Holocaust and the Soviet Gulag.* 

It was amazing and gratifying to see such an assemblage of domestic and international scholars converge at NAU at the request of MSI. It was an honor to get to know participants engaged with those difficult issues. We love to see MSI gaining an international reputation. What a terrific conference!

## **UPCOMING 2023-2024**

Several events are planned for the upcoming year. We would be happy to add your name to our email list.

In the fall, we are partnering with **Creative Flagstaff on a photography exhibit** about border/migration, and with **United Christian Ministry** on a commemoration of former NAU student **Kayla Mueller**, on the 10th anniversary of her abduction by ISIS. With NAU's **Criminology/Criminal Justice** department we are organizing a speaker event on **White Supremacy**. We may have a part in a planned performance of **Handel's** *Judas Maccabeus* by Flagstaff's **Master Chorale**. We will continue to host teacher trainings in June and are exploring options **with Cline Library** to bring the "**Americans and the Holocaust**" **exhibit** to NAU. Stay tuned.

#### A New Space for the Martin-Springer Institute

#### A New Reproduction of the Bedzin Exhibit

After ten years of heavy use, we are in desperate need of refreshing the traveling Będzin exhibit. It has become worn out and fragile and can no longer travel – just at a moment when we already have seven requests for exhibiting it in educational and public settings in the coming year. The estimated cost is \$10,000. If you are interested in helping us to redo the exhibit, please contact us.

#### **New Student Projects**

We always need funds for our multi-semester student-faculty teams engaged in creating public humanities/public history projects, like the recently completed exhibition and podcast series on the artist Gino Parin in Italy during the Holocaust, or the digital exhibit on the signed 1938 fan from the Spanish Civil War.

We are currently exploring options for projects that could include stories of Arizona residents with Jewish family backgrounds in Frankfurt, Germany; a collection of photographs from the perspective of Nazi perpetrators; or, related to it, the problematics of displaying "toxic" objects from lethal legacies.

#### **Teacher Professional Development**

We would again like to offer the "Four-Day Intensive Institute" for Arizona teachers (see page 2) in the summer of 2024 and need to raise \$15,000 to make it possible.
