This year's drive, in partnership with the Center for Service and Volunteerism, was a huge success, and we want to thank everyone who donated and helped sort the items. We collected 301 food items, 85 miscellaneous kitchen supplies for Louie's Cupboard, and 1,143 warm coats and other clothing items for the Lumberjack CARE Center and local community organizations that support people experiencing homelessness or who

SAC COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS CONTINUED

Giving Tree Project

Coconino CASA for Kids (CCFK) exists to serve and improve the lives of abused, neglected, and abandoned children, youth, and young adults of Coconino County. This year over 60 donors, including a whole department and an Aerobic Winter Challenge team, provided a total of 83 gifts to 30 youth currently in foster care in Coconino County. An additional 22 gift cards were donated at a total value of \$830. These cards will impact youth who enter foster care in coming weeks and months.

SAC and the Center for Service and Volunteerism combined forces once again in April to coordinate an Earth Day project with the City of Flagstaff. Together we recruited 40 volunteers, most of them NAU staff members, to build a half mile of fire line on Observatory Mesa in the heart of Flagstaff. This project helped educate the volunteers about the work wildland fire crews do to protect the community and gave them an opportunity to directly contribute to reduce wildfire risk. The fire line was put to good use the following month during a prescribed burn.

Service and Volunteer Engagement

As seen with our highlighted community service projects, the service and volunteer engagement committee has been busy hosting a number of events to support the NAU and Flagstaff communities. The committee is working to provide more opportunities for staff to use their community engagement hours this summer, including an open space project and organizing shifts at the Flagstaff Family Food Center and High Country Humane.



The mixer and fundraising committee put together another wonderful annual mixer attended by 500+ staff at Flagstaff Mountain Campus, North Valley, Tucson, and Yuma. The committee also expanded its scope to enhance SAC's fundraising efforts to provide financial support to staff. SAC participated in its first Giving Day, raising \$2,200 to support the Employee Lumberjack Fund (ELF), which provides emergency funds for staff experiencing a crisis or unforeseen circumstance.

Community Building

The community building committee's focus is to help staff throughout the university feel connected and supported. This year's focus was creating better connections with our statewide campuses. NAU Yuma, Tucson, and North Valley now participate in SAC meetings through watch parties and joined the Flagstaff Mountain campus in celebrating staff during the annual mixer.
