# 132 Arizona High School Students Receive Scholarships from College Success Arizona

Awards include financial support and intensive mentoring services for students to attend Arizona colleges and universities.

*Phoenix, AZ* – 132 highly successful Arizona High School students received a notification recently that they will be receiving a scholarship to be help them attend one of Arizona's colleges or universities.

Hundreds of students applied for the scholarships, which includes up to \$6,000 per year in financial assistance and an intensive set of Success Services, that includes professional mentoring, that complement the scholarship. Out of the initial applicant pool, 180 students were invited for personal interviews. From those interviews, 132 promising high school seniors, with high financial need, will be awarded scholarships. "The students that apply for our program continue to amaze me," said Marjorie DeRubeis, College Success Arizona's Director of Partnership Development and Success Services. "It broke my heart to have to tell some of these great students that they weren't being awarded a scholarship from us, but there's only so much funding to go around."

"This is our 13<sup>th</sup> year of awarding scholarships," said Rich Nickel, President and CEO of College Success Arizona. "With this year's group of scholars, we'll have been able to help over 1,400 high potential, low-income Arizona students with mentoring and scholarship awards to attend Arizona's colleges and universities. We've been supporting Arizona students, Arizona institutions, and Arizona communities since 2005. We're very proud of the services we provide, and the successes our scholars have had."

"It has been widely reported that by the year 2020, nearly 70 percent of all jobs in Arizona will require a career certificate or college degree. Right now, just 44% of our working age adults have that qualification. Just attending college is not enough. To get the full benefit, students need to graduate with a certificate or degree. Still, just over 50 percent of the full-time students seeking bachelor's degrees at Arizona universities will graduate within six years. If a student is from a low-income background, or is a minority; or if the student is a first-generation college student, or attends college part-time, the chances of success are even lower. College Success Arizona specializes in helping students stay on track and graduate, by providing valuable mentoring and other success enhancing services. 70 percent of our students are the first in their families to attend college, and to date, our diverse, highly motivated students have a six year graduation rate of nearly 70 percent — a significantly higher average than their peers across the country."

This year's scholarship recipients come from across the state, and include the communities of Casa Grande, Holbrook, Winslow, Bullhead City, Avondale, Tucson, Gilbert, Cottonwood, Prescott, San Luis, Mohave Valley, Scottsdale, Kingman, Douglas, and Phoenix.

College Success Arizona works with educational partners, such as Arizona GEAR UP, from across state to identify potential scholars, whose graduation from a four-year university will increase Arizona's competitiveness, and economy in the years ahead. College Success Arizona enjoys strong relationships with other organizations such as Education Talent Search, Upward Bound Four Corners, Be A Leader Foundation, Jobs for Arizona Graduates, Mathematics Engineering Science Achievement, MEC Regional College Access Center, College Bound Arizona, Yuma Educational Talent Search/Upward Bound, and many others. These organizations work closely with all of Arizona's institutions of higher learning to ensure that Arizona can compete for high paying jobs in the decades to come.

This group of College Success Arizona Scholars will begin their college journeys in June with an in-depth orientation.
