

Arizona GEAR UP | Strengthening the Education Pipeline

Every child deserves access to a quality education and the opportunity to earn a college degree. Arizona's economic prosperity depends on increasing the number of residents with degrees or workplace credentials. Since 2000, Arizona GEAR UP has strengthened the pipeline leading to educational attainment on behalf of the state in two ways:

 One, by increasing high school graduation and postsecondary enrollment for thousands of students from diverse communities across Arizona: GEAR UP provides college awareness and readiness services to all students in an entire cohort (graduating class) beginning in seventh grade and continuing through high school and into the first year of college. Cultivating the motivation, knowledge, and skills needed for entire cohorts to succeed along the pathway to college creates a sustainable, highexpectations culture in partner schools that benefits subsequent cohorts of students.

45% of Arizona residents 25-64 years of age have completed a 2- or 4-year degree or received a postsecondary certificate1


GEAR UP works! | Outcomes/evidence of success

Under NAU's first two grant cycles (2000–2006 and 2006–2012), GEAR UP students graduated and entered college at rates far exceeding the state averages, as verified by student-level data and independent evaluations. These outcomes, shown in the below graphic, were attained despite low-income and other disadvantages of the student populations in the communities that GEAR UP served.




• And two, by leveraging resources to support Arizona's education priorities and expanding capacity to make local and state initiatives possible: GEAR UP advances broader and shared aims with a variety of partners committed to improving Arizona's educational outcomes—ensuring that the state's strategies to achieve its educational attainment goal extend beyond GEAR UP communities alone succeed. These partnerships and collaborations leverage resources, build capacity, support priorities, and make a variety of local and state initiatives that both current and future students benefit from possible.

Similarly, a matched comparison-group research study shows that GEAR UP students served under the 2012–2019 cycle beat the odds relative to FAFSA completion and graduation, as shown in the graphic below.



^{*}In 2012, the GEAR UP Evaluator worked with staff at the AZ Department of Education to identify 20 high schools similar to the 12 GEAR UP high schools in baseline academics, graduation rate, student to teacher ratio, locale, school letter grade, social economic and ethnic composition, and Title I status for purposes of a statistically valid comparison.

GEAR UP Grant

GEAR UP is a highly-competitive grant program of the US Department of Education, authorized by Congress in 1999 under the Higher Education Opportunity Act to help level the playing field on college access for low-income students. Now in 44 states, its purpose is to significantly increase the number of students from low-income communities who graduate high school prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education. The Department awards six- or seven-year grants to states and to partnerships between universities and economically disadvantaged schools. Successful applicants must match the federal award, dollar for dollar.

2000 NAU is awarded a six-year, \$12.6M State GEAR UP grant under Governor Jane Hull, as well as a six-year, \$9.1M Partnership grant.

2006 Governor Janet Napolitano names NAU as the applicant for a new six-year state GEAR UP grant, subsequently awarded at \$16.9M.

2012 Under Governor Jan Brewer, NAU is awarded \$30 million in federal funds to administer Arizona GEAR UP 2012–2019.

2019 Arizona Governor Doug Ducey recognizes GEAR UP as uniquely qualified to partner in achieving Arizona's postsecondary attainment goal and names NAU as applicant to compete for a new GEAR UP grant on behalf of the state.
